

Latest Research Product: Workers Accomplishing Independence

Phase I Findings

Currently finalizing journal article for *Science, Technology and Human Values* (STHV) about how independent workers accomplish their independence.

We build on Suchman’s theory of *articulation work* (1996) to argue that workers’ independence is an ongoing, effortful accomplishment that typically draws on two types of “structuring moves”: **anticipatory** (pre-emptive) and **adaptive** (real-time).

Structuring moves are constrained by the “densities” that define the professional and non-professional aspects of a worker’s life. We define ‘density’ as the degree to which a person feels obligation to others.

Moves are also enabled and constrained by the different **resources** that a worker has to hand. Resources include money, space, social connections, technology, and time—the latter being the only fixed resource that everyone shares despite it being experienced differently.

One tool I use on days like today is the voice memo app on my phone....In those brief moments I'll work on a new song or piece of music for a specific project. Because I know my time is limited and I'm afraid I'll lose or forget what I was creating, I'll record what I'm working on with the voice memo app. This is the fastest and easiest way to get down a musical idea and allows me to come back to it easily.

Upcoming Research: Phase II Design Workshops

Independent Work in a Time of Uncertainty

Conducting a comprehensive interview + diary study of independent workers who have experienced a major change since 2020. This will allow us to further refine the **interview + diary method**, examine with greater specificity the **pervasive uncertainty** these workers are facing, and honor the COVID19 experience in these data without focusing only on the effect of the pandemic on independent work.
